We had a varied range of research projects on show which highlighted the students' individual interests and chosen career paths. LONDON TRIP

English students enjoyed a day out on the Southbank to watch a contemporary performance of Shakespeare's 'Othello' at the Sam Wanamaker theatre, all enjoyed by candlelight. This was an amazing modern take of a classic play. Students were inspired by the production's incorporation of 21st century mental health issues and how racial inequalities can be reported in the media, alongside the occasional substitution of Shakespeare's language to mirror debates within the Metropolitan Police. This all helped to enhance their understanding of themes and issues studied within the play. We look forward to making this an annual trip to enrich students' cultural experience of the arts.

On Friday 1st March year 12 Geography students got the chance to visit the bustling and vibrant Brick Lane area of London. During the afternoon they carried out a range of urban fieldwork strategies that will help support them in designing ideas for their independent study (NEA). Examples of the fieldwork methods they used were: mood mapping, anti-crime surveys, walkability assessments and soundscapes. This data will be used next term by students to help them reflect on ways that they can present raw data and analyse their findings. Brick Lane will also be a key case study that the students will use for their next unit of study 'Changing Places'. The day also provided students with a valuable insight into a contrasting place that is demographically and culturally different to Melton. Well done to all the students who attended for a superb approach and attitude during this trip!



This year our students have formed an Eco Committee and are developing an action plan to make MV more sustainable, increase environmental learning and benefit our local community. Biodiversity is just one area they are championing as part of our application for the prestigious Eco-Schools Green Flag award. We were very fortunate to receive a grant from The Tree Council's Branching Out Fund to enable us to establish a new hedgerow along the southern boundary of the college grounds. On the 15th and 16th March, many members of the MV community came together to enjoy some fresh air and community spirit planting the hedge. Thank you to our students, staff, stakeholders and Birch Wood School who helped us plant 1200 plants in 2 days.
